<u>Liturgical Notes for the Christmas Season</u>

The season of Christmas lasts for twelve days, from December 25 through January 5. With Christmas we begin to look at what God has done for us through His Son, Jesus Christ. Through Him our sins have been forgiven and washed away. The parametrs up front are white, symbolizing the glory and holiness of the newborn Savior.

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

First Lesson - 1 Samuel 2:18-20,26

Samuel was ministering before the LORD—a boy wearing a linen ephod. Each year his mother made him a little robe and took it to him when she went up with her husband to offer the annual sacrifice. Eli would bless Elkanah and his wife, saying, "May the LORD give you children by this woman to take the place of the one she prayed for and gave to the LORD." Then they would go home. | And the boy Samuel continued to grow in stature and in favor with the LORD and with men.

Psalm for the Day – From Psalm 122

- P I rejoiced with those who said to me:
- C "Let us go to the house of the LORD."
- P Our feet are standing in your gates:
- C O Jerusalem.
- P That is where the tribes of the LORD go up:
- C To praise the name of the LORD.
- P Pray for the peace of Jerusalem:
- C "May those who love you be secure.
- P May there be peace within your walls:
- C And security within your citadels."
- P For the sake of my brothers and friends:
- C I will say, "Peace be within you."
- P For the sake of the house of the LORD our God:
- C I will seek your prosperity.

Second Lesson – Hebrews 2:10-18

In bringing many sons to glory, it was fitting that God, for whom and through whom everything exists, should make the author of their salvation perfect through suffering. Both the one who makes men holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers. He says, "I will declare your name to my brothers; in the presence of the congregation I will sing your praises." And again, "I will put my trust in him." And again he says, "Here am I, and the children God has given me." Since the children have flesh and blood, he too shared in their humanity so that by his death he might destroy him who holds the power of death—that is, the devil— and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death. For surely it is not angels he helps, but Abraham's descendants. For this reason he had to be made like his brothers in every way, in order that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in service to God, and that he might make atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted.

Sermon Text - Luke 2:41-52

Every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up to the Feast, according to the custom. After the Feast was over, while his parents were returning home, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but they were unaware of it. Thinking he was in their company, they traveled on for a day.

Then they began looking for him among their relatives and friends. When they did not find him, they went back to Jerusalem to look for him. After three days they found him in the temple courts, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. Everyone who heard him was amazed at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him, they were astonished. His mother said to him, "Son, why have you treated us like this? Your father and I have been anxiously searching for you." "Why were you searching for me?" he asked. "Didn't you know I had to be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he was saying to them. Then he went down to Nazareth with them and was obedient to them. But his mother treasured all these things in her heart. And Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions December 31 - January 5

Mon The Book of **Joel** voices God's troubled heart, for human sins of the present are prelude to God's penalties in the future—so listen up (1:2-5)! God had a whole menagerie of penalties lined up for His disobedient people: a plague of locusts followed by infertile seed (1:17-18) and prairie fires—all of which clanged like a fire-alarm: *Repent! Rend your heart! Return to the LORD your God!* Get your act together, every one of you, for then (and only then) will God relent, sending rain and renewal (2: 18-27).

Tues 2:28-32 Both rain and renewal would prelude the extra-special blessing of another deluge from heaven—an outpouring of God's own Spirit, so that youngsters and old-timers would become God's spokespersons in the New Testament era. The Holy Spirit used the Apostle Peter (Acts 2:17-21) to explain that Joel's prophecy was fulfilled on Pentecost. *Then those who gladly received his word were baptized, and about 3,000 souls were added!*

Wed 3:12-14 What is meant by the *Valley of Jehoshaphat* and *the Valley of decision*? In Moses' day, the valley between Mt. Ebal and Mt. Gerizim was chosen by God for a showdown with His people (Deut.11:26-29)—which set the stage for the Last Judgment, where God decides (makes the decision) between those who are His own and those whom He does not recognize.

Thurs Amos: What was wrong with Syria, Philistia, Phoenicia, Edom, Ammon, and Moab? Their religion was wrong, and their morality was worse; the Jews were just as bad, for they had squandered God's great mercies (ch. 3). Will your/my obituary reveal a heart for God and God's business (ch. 4)? Sham religion will not help (ch. 5-6). Without wrath, mercy loses its punch (ch.7).

Fri Amos 8:11-14 Hunger is good and famine is better, for famine will drive people out of their homeland, foreigners will be converted, and that miracle will whet the Jews' appetite for the LORD, too. The apostles understood how this worked during their time of grace (Acts 15:13-17). Praise the LORD!

Sat The book of Obadiah is only one chapter long and is difficult to locate in the history of the Jews, but it focuses on God's judgment upon the Edomites, descendants of Esau, for sitting on the fence when their cousins, Jacob's descendants, needed their help. That was the sin of omission, the sin of refraining from doing what God wants you to do. Who would not be scared to have God say to you: *As you have done, it shall be done to you; your reprisal shall return upon your own head* (15)? In contrast, God promises to salvage His faithful remnant, *and the kingdom shall be the LORD's* (17-21). Hwy. 2018 has closed, and the open road of 2019 stretches out before us; Lord, with Your Spirit keep us humble, faithful, and loving as we travel home.
