

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

First Lesson - Lamentations 3:22-33

22 Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. 23 They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. 24 I say to myself, "The LORD is my portion; therefore I will wait for him." 25 The LORD is good to those whose hope is in him, to the one who seeks him; 26 it is good to wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD. 27 It is good for a man to bear the yoke while he is young. 28 Let him sit alone in silence, for the LORD has laid it on him. 29 Let him bury his face in the dust— there may yet be hope. 30 Let him offer his cheek to one who would strike him, and let him be filled with disgrace. 31 For men are not cast off by the LORD forever. 32 Though he brings grief, he will show compassion, so great is his unfailing love. 33 For he does not willingly bring affliction or grief to the children of men.

Psalm of the Day – From Psalm 62

Second Lesson - Psalm 30

1 I will exalt you, O LORD, for you lifted me out of the depths and did not let my enemies gloat over me. 2 O LORD my God, I called to you for help and you healed me. 3 O LORD, you brought me up from the grave; you spared me from going down into the pit. 4 Sing to the LORD, you saints of his; praise his holy name. 5 For his anger lasts only a moment, but his favor lasts a lifetime; weeping may remain for a night, but rejoicing comes in the morning. 6 When I felt secure, I said, "I will never be shaken." 7 O LORD, when you favored me, you made my mountain stand firm; but when you hid your face, I was dismayed. 8 To you, O LORD, I called; to the Lord I cried for mercy: 9 "What gain is there in my destruction, in my going down into the pit? Will the dust praise you? Will it proclaim your faithfulness? 10 Hear, O LORD, and be merciful to me; O Lord, be my help." 11 You turned my wailing into dancing; you removed my sackcloth and clothed me with joy, 12 that my heart may sing to you and not be silent. O LORD my God, I will give you thanks forever.

Sermon Text - Mark 5:25-34

25 Now a certain woman had a flow of blood for twelve years, 26 and had suffered many things from many physicians. She had spent all that she had and was no better, but rather grew worse. 27 When she heard about Jesus, she came behind Him in the crowd and touched His garment. 28 For she said, "If only I may touch His clothes, I shall be made well." 29 Immediately the fountain of her blood was dried up, and she felt in her body that she was healed of the affliction. 30 And Jesus, immediately knowing in Himself that power had gone out of Him, turned around in the crowd and said, "Who touched My clothes?" 31 But His disciples said to Him, "You see the multitude thronging You, and You say, 'Who touched Me?" 32 And He looked around to see her who had done this thing. 33 But the woman, fearing and trembling, knowing what had happened to her, came and fell down before Him and told Him the whole truth. 34 And He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well. Go in peace, and be healed of your affliction." [NKJV]

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions July 22-27

Mon 1 Samuel 3:1-4:1a Samuel's dream was reality, for the LORD was calling him to condemn Eli. When Eli heard the LORD's condemnation/Law, he swallowed his pride and surrendered. The Law is hard for us to swallow, and it was hard for Jesus, too—but He did so that we could arise and enjoy the LORD's presence—whether at home or at church (Shiloh). Samuel went on to graduate from God's training school, and he served well in the ministry.

Tues Luke 10:1-16 Jesus laid out His protocol for seminary grads: "Go where you are led—into a hostile world; you don't need a secular job; find people who are receptive; don't play favorites; and eat what's on your plate. When you encounter hostiles, let them know they are hostile to God, and that's a dead end. I take it personal how people respond to your/My Word (16)."

Wed 1 Peter 5:1-5 Whether in pulpit or classroom, the holy ministry is holy because it's God's work to be under-shepherds of the Good Shepherd, Jesus. We understand that pastors are human and subject to human temptations (2-3). *Elders* (v. 1) can mean men entrusted with privileged responsibilities (better than duties), or it can mean older in contrast to younger (v. 5). All in all, we accommodate ourselves to the needs of others and give them priority.

Thurs Ezekiel 2:1-7 God pulled Ezekiel to his feet because a messenger who cringes is of little use. Yet how can a man avoid cringing? By God energizing him with the Holy Spirit, of course. How sad that the children of Israel had become *impudent and stubborn*, needing scolding to bring them around. A good spokesman of God does not cringe before sinners who are stubborn against God, for they need tough love to overcome their impudence. Amen!

Fri Luke 13:34-35 Jesus agonized over the way His countrymen were set on going to hell. He tried over-and-over to crack through their consciences toughened enough to kill the prophets and others whom God had sent to rescue them. Being tough against God is suicidal, for standing behind a bullet-proof shield against God is no defense against Satan, who is happy to shoot you in the back. Blessed are the vulnerable, for they shall be healed!

Sat 2 Corinthians 4:3-11 Missionaries to the Jews had a tough row to hoe, for Satan had programmed them to turn a blind eye against Jesus. It's the same story today in countries (and hearts) enthralled by Satan's fake deities. (We could name the big fakes, but you know them already.) In contrast, God has enlightened us, and we enjoy our privileged status with God—even when the going gets tough. In fact, our vulnerability is Jesus' opportunity to prove Himself as our Lord and Savior (10-11). All hail the power of Jesus' name!
