

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

First Lesson – Hebrews 13:1-8

I Keep on loving each other as brothers. 2 Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some people have entertained angels without knowing it. 3 Remember those in prison as if you were their fellow prisoners, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering. 4 Marriage should be honored by all, and the marriage bed kept pure, for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral. 5 Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." 6 So we say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can man do to me?" 7 Remember your leaders, who spoke the word of God to you. Consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith. 8 Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.


Second Lesson - Luke 14:1-14

1 One Sabbath, when Jesus went to eat in the house of a prominent Pharisee, he was being carefully watched. 2 There in front of him was a man suffering from dropsy. 3 Jesus asked the Pharisees and experts in the law, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath or not?" 4 But they remained silent. So taking hold of the man, he healed him and sent him away. 5 Then he asked them, "If one of you has a son or an ox that falls into a well on the Sabbath day, will you not immediately pull him out?" 6 And they had nothing to say. 7 When he noticed how the guests picked the places of honor at the table, he told them this parable: 8 "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. 9 If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this man your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. 10 But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up

to a better place.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all your fellow guests. 11 For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." 12 Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. 13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, 14 and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Sermon Text - Proverbs 25:6-7

6 Do not exalt yourself in the king's presence, and do not claim a place among great men; 7 it is better for him to say to you, "Come up here," than for him to humiliate you before a nobleman.

DAILY BIBLE READINGS FOR HOME DEVOTIONS SEPTEMBER 23-28

Mon Numbers 12 The motivation of Miriam and Aaron was not to protect the status of Moses but to upgrade their own, so they slandered him. When Moses refrained from asserting himself (3), the LORD Jehovah put His foot down (4), setting the record straight about Moses and chastising them for bad-mouthing God's servant (which amounted to bad-mouthing God). Aaron repented quickly, but Miriam needed to learn humility by being ostracized, losing her health and good looks to boot. Lord, have mercy!

Tues Luke 6:6-11 In another confrontation with God, the ungodly set Jesus up for a situation that would test His "orthodoxy." They bet that He would ignore the Sabbath traditions and help the crippled man. So Jesus quite deliberately and pointedly did a labor of love on the day when nobody else dared to work. That undercut <u>their</u> orthodoxy, which they took as an insult. Bottom line: motivation is everything, just as we knew all along.

Wed James 3:6-18 We humans are perverse in how we use God's gifts —even the gift of speech. From time to time we're guilty of slander—against God or neighbor; we might even spread harmful gossip about a member of our church. What's behind it all? Envy, insecurity, false pride, and cheating on the Truth (14). May God grant us more of His peaceable, gentle, good- hearted, merciful, impartial, honorable, and decent attitude (17-18). Amen!

Thurs Zechariah 8:7-13 This prophet was one of God's spokesmen during those 70 years when God was chastising the Hebrews in a foreign country (the Babylonian Captivity), but God didn't want them to lose hope. So He vowed, "I will save My people . . . I will bring them back home (7-8); hang in there, for I am preparing you to be a blessing to others; don't be so scared of the future that you lose your grip on Me (13)." Lord, help us in like manner!

Fri Mark 3:1-6 It really hurt that the church leaders wanted to catch Jesus promoting false doctrine or ungodly behavior but were unconcerned about helping the crippled man. Their hardness of heart was painful to Jesus, but that didn't stop Him from restoring the fellow to a normal life so he could care for himself, hold a job, and be a provider for his family. How sad that the church council didn't see it that way (6)! Glory be to Jesus!

Sat Acts 2:37-41 God worked hard to salvage what could be salvaged, and He squeezed them to repent (37). With hearts reborn via Jesus' Holy Spirit, they were invited to share in all of God's blessings (38-39), and they absorbed everything Peter told them (40). God accepted them into the Holy Christian Church, and they joined the local congregation (41). Hallelujah! Stay tuned.

DAILY BIBLE READINGS FOR HOME DEVOTIONS SEPTEMBER 16-21 (CATCHING UP FROM LAST WEEK)

Mon 1 Samuel 2:27-36 Eli's clergy sons had debased the public ministry, but Eli had not defrocked them, so God confronted Eli: "Didn't I give you the privilege of being My spokesman, an honor despised by your sons? Therefore they have to go, your entire family tree will die out at an early age, and I am shifting this privileged responsibility over onto Samuel." Bottom line: those who diss God are committing suicide. Lord, have mercy on such (and on us)!

Tues Luke 20:41-44 In Jesus' day, the reigning clergy had gone astray in a way that was just as bad, for they no longer believed in the Resurrection. They didn't understand Exodus 3:6,15 and Psalm 110, where Jehovah speaks to His Son, our Lord Jesus, who prevails over all opposition on Earth and over Satan. They were blind leaders of the blind, and both were falling into the ditch.

Wed Romans 2:11-16 The line of thought goes like this: There are two kinds of people—those who have the Bible as their compass in life, and those who don't; their compass in life is conscience unguided by the Bible. Neither of them gets away with sin, for God judges fair-and-square <u>by Jesus Christ.</u> Bottom line: Depend on God's impartial mercy delivered via His Son.

Thurs Proverbs 2 Meanwhile, what's our compass in every-day life? We want to understand what God wants us to understand about Him and about ourselves. That's true wisdom, for it bolsters our daily walk of life, makes us sensitive to others, governs the way we treat others, and preserves us in the way God outlines for us while we live in a world that has gone to the Devil.

Fri Luke 11:44-54 It's almost beyond belief that Jewish clergy of Jesus' day were so perverse that they used religiosity as a cover-up for their inner rottenness (44), and they felt comfortable with a double standard of morality (46). They honored their forefathers who had murdered God's spokesmen in ancient times (47-48), and they were using their Bible classes to turn people away from the Truth. When Jesus warned that they were in deep trouble with God, they turned against Him viciously and vehemently. WOE to them!

Sat Acts 2:29-36 presents a <u>real</u> Bible class, where Peter explained the meaning of Joel's prophecy (Joel 2:28-30) before moving on to explain Psalm 16:8-11, which is understandable when you are clear on Psalm 110:1 -- that David was not speaking about himself being resurrected, but about Jesus being raised from the dead and ascending to heaven, where He is Lord and Messiah. "Now," said Peter, "You must realize and take it to heart that you treated God's chosen Lord and Messiah like dirt!" They had put themselves on a track that would lead to their destruction, and they needed to know it. Was God merciful to them, inspiring them to repent? Stay tuned.
