

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

Old Testament - Micah 6:1-8

1 Listen to what the LORD says: "Stand up, plead your case before the mountains; let the hills hear what you have to say. 2 Hear, O mountains, the LORD's accusation; listen, you everlasting foundations of the earth. For the LORD has a case against his people; he is lodging a charge against Israel. 3 My people, what have I done to you? How have I burdened you? Answer me. 4 I brought you up out of Egypt and redeemed you from the land of slavery. I sent Moses to lead you, also Aaron and Miriam. 5 My people, remember what Balak king of Moab counseled and what Balaam son of Beor answered. Remember [your journey] from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the righteous acts of the LORD." 6 With what shall I come before the LORD and bow down before the exalted God? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? 7 Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul? 8 He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Psalm of the Day - From Psalm 1

- P Blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked:
- C Or stand in the way of sinners or sit in the seat of mockers.
- P But his delight is in the law of the Lord:
- C And on his law he meditates day and night.
- P He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season:
- C And whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers.
- P Not so the wicked!
- C They are like chaff that the wind blows away.
- P Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment:
- C Nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
- P For the Lord watches over the way of the righteous:
- C But the way of the wicked will perish.

Second Lesson – Matthew 5:1-12

1 Now when he saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, 2 and he began to teach them, saying: 3 "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 4 Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. 5 Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. 6 Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. 7 Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. 8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. 9 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God. 10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 11 Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. 12 Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Sermon Text - 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

26 Brothers, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. 27 But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. 28 He chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, 29 so that no one may boast before him. 30 It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption. 31 Therefore, as it is written: "Let him who boasts boast in the Lord."

- "With the approval of the CLC President, the Board of Regents for ILC is suspending the calling of the next professor. In the past year the Regents and ILC President have been reevaluating how to address all of ILC's administration functions. As this has developed, we considered this a timely opportunity to implement a full-time administrator position by keeping the faculty at 11 professors after this year's retirement of Prof. Paul Sullivan. We are working through the details with the faculty to determine if this is a viable option. If so, the intent is to present a proposal to the 2020 CLC Convention. May the Lord of the harvest continue to lead us in managing the available man-power within our church body so that our primary focus is on the preaching and teaching of His powerful Word" (from John Hein, Chairman of the Board of Regents)

DAILY BIBLE READINGS FOR HOME DEVOTIONS FEBRUARY 3-8

Mon Micah 6:1-8 Since God is the same yesterday, today, and forever—and humanity hasn't changed much, God vents a complaint against us also, and not behind closed doors but out in the open, in a valley between mountains where His voice reverbs (1-2), saying, "What have I ever done to make you disrespect Me? I have always treated you famously." (3-5) Now comes a good response: "I'm sorry; how can I make it up to You?" (6-7) God: "Well, at the least you should behave as My child: honorably, mercifully, and humbly" (8).

Tues Matthew 5:1-12 We don't always appreciate how blessed we are, so Jesus clarifies that we are beneficiaries of many blessings, even when we are hassled for being God's favorites (11-12). Our human nature won't agree with Jesus' evaluation, but the Holy Spirit prompts us to depend on His good judgment; He knows what He's doing better than we realize.

Wed 1 Corinthians 1:26-31 God knows our congregational statistics (26) —which somewhat represents His congregation in our small corner of the world. Note: God has sifted through the rubble of humanity and has chosen to use discards for His building materials (27-28). For what good reason? Well, if He had started with high-grade materials, that would short-change the miracle which God is accomplishing in this sin-wrecked world (29-31).

Thurs Psalm 1 We live with God's protection every day as we steer clear of sin-soaked renegades (1), learn to navigate by His directives (2), and enjoy life (3). Our heart aches for those who are blowing with the wind and headed for the furnace (4-5). Please, God, salvage what can yet be salvaged — using Your good judgment with each individual, person by person (6)!

Fri Matthew 13:53-58 Humans have always had a hard time facing the facts, especially when they are God's facts. Jesus ran into that every day of His life, even in His home town and suburbs. People should have been able to figure Him out, but they were looking at Him in the wrong way (54-57). So Jesus left them behind; He had other places to go and other people to see (58).

Sat Acts 7:37-50 Was Stephen guilty of bad-mouthing Moses? Not at all, for the guilt lay with our fathers who rejected Moses and abandoned God's religion (37-41). So what did God do about that? He turned aside and let them eat their own garbage (42-43). Nonetheless, He did not desert them for long, for He even engineered a portable church (the tabernacle) where He could supervise their public worship. That was just temporary, and later He allowed Solomon to erect a splendid temple for such worship. Note: It was an insult to God to imagine that He needed earthly housing for Himself, since He has heaven for His throne and Earth for His footstool. Are we okay with that?
