Second Lesson 2 Peter 1:16-21

We did not follow cleverly invented stories when we told you about the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when the voice came to him from the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice that came from heaven when we were with him on the sacred mountain.

And we have the word of the prophets made more certain, and you will do well to pay attention to it, as to a light shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation. For prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.

Third Lesson Luke 8:4-15

While a large crowd was gathering and people were coming to Jesus from town after town, he told this parable: "A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path; it was trampled on, and the birds of the air ate it up. Some fell on rock, and when it came up, the plants withered because they had no moisture. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up with it and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil. It came up and yielded a crop, a hundred times more than was sown."

"This is the meaning of the parable: The seed is the word of God. Those along the path are the ones who hear, and then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, so that they may not believe and be saved. Those on the rock are the ones who receive the word with joy when they hear it, but they have no root. They believe for a while, but in the time of testing they fall away. The seed that fell among thorns stands for those who hear, but as they go on their way they are choked by life's worries, riches and pleasures, and they do not mature. But the seed on good soil stands for those with a noble and good heart, who hear the word, retain it, and by persevering produce a crop.

Confession of Faith

From the Epitome of the Formula of Concord

We believe, teach, and confess that the only rule and norm according to which all teachings, together with all teachers, should be evaluated and judged are the prophetic and apostolic Scriptures of the Old and New Testament alone. For it is written in Psalm 119:105, "Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." St. Paul has written, "even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel contrary to the one we preached to you, let him be accursed" (Galatians 1:8).

However, other writings by ancient or modern teachers—no matter whose name they bear—must not be regarded as equal to the Holy Scriptures. All of them are subject to the Scriptures. Other writings should not be received in any other way or as anything more than witnesses that testify about how this pure doctrine of the prophets and apostles was preserved after the time of the apostles . . .

In this way the distinction between the Holy Scriptures of the Old and of the New Testament and all other writings is preserved. The Holy Scriptures alone remain the judge, rule, and norm. According to them—as the only touchstone—all teachings shall and must be discerned and judged to see whether they are good or evil, right or wrong.

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One of the most familiar symbols of the Church is a ship sailing through troubled waters. It symbolizes the Ship of the Church threatened by the storms of persecution, heresy, dissension, unionism, and indifference to sound doctrine. Its only hope for survival is not the seamanship of the crew, but the divine power and mercy of its Unseen Pilot, Christ our Lord, the Head of the Church, who stilled the tempest on the Sea of Galilee. <> The symbolism of the ship has carried over into the vocabulary of church architecture: the main auditorium of a church between the chancel and narthex is called the *nave*, a term derived from the Latin word for ship — *navis*.



Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions - November 1-6

Mon Jeremiah 18:1-11 Ancient Palestinians suffered much from foreigners, and God was using them to bring Israel to repentance. Israel's problem was common to humans: moral degeneration which begins with individuals (11) and soon infects the entire nation. Unrepented sin brings disastrous consequences; on the other hand, God relents and rebuilds a future for repentant individuals and repentant nations. [It sounds current, doesn't it?]

Tues Mark 13:1-11 Jesus upgraded Jeremiah's warning for the Jews (1-2), which fits our world, too (5-8). *So watch out for yourselves*, Christians, for you will be persecuted and face court trials (9). When that happens to you, God's Holy Spirit will give you the right responses for a testimony to/against them. [Martin Luther was blessed via that experience; praise the Lord!]

Wed Revelation 14:6-7 *Angel* = messenger, and this one was air-borne so he could broadcast his message *to all those who dwell on the Earth—to every nation, tribe, tongue, and people, saying with a loud voice, "Revere God and give glory to Him, for your time* of grace has evaporated! Get down on your knees and *worship Him who created* a viable *Earth* until He finishes it off in flames [2 Peter 3:10]. Martin Luther was God's messenger, and today many others are using the air-waves to broadcast God's Word.

Thurs Psalm 46 Since *God is our Refuge and Strength, a very present help in trouble*, we can face catastrophes (1-3) from a safe place (4-5). Even if Europe, Asia, Africa, Indonesia, and the Americas go berserk, we will *take refuge in the God of Jacob* (cf. Genesis 28:13-15). When life gets scary, let's remind ourselves that God is still behind the steering wheel (8-9). That knowledge helps us o quit complaining (10). Repeat. Repeat.

Fri Matthew 24:1-14 We are less interested in the Temple than the disciples were; they were impressed, Jesus was not. We are more interested in the next question: "What will be the sign of Your coming, and of the end of the age?" They wanted advance notice on the arrival of Judgment Day. Here are the clues: False saviors will deceive many, wars and natural disasters will multiply; you will be targeted, too. There's only one redeeming factor that will prepare humanity for meeting Jesus (14). God grant it!

Sat 1 Corinthians 1:4-9 Let's sit down and count our blessings. We have been *given* the grace of *God via Christ Jesus;* we have been enriched in every-which way via Jesus; God has not begrudged us any blessing, and He has pledged to carry us through to the end, so *that we may be blameless in the day of our Lord, Jesus Christ.* God is dependable! Count on it (9)! Amen and Amen!

REFORMATION ... PAST AND PRESENT

The man whom God raised up in the history of the Church to lead His people back to the saving Gospel wrote these words as part of his little handbook for teaching children (the Small Catechism): "... and that again a new man should daily come forth and arise who shall live before God in righteousness and purity forever."

It is one thing for Lutherans to gather together sometime close to the end of October and attempt to keep their children's minds on the history of the Reformation rather than on "tricks or treats." But is is quite another matter for parents and children alike to focus on what the Reformation is all about today.

Need For Reformation

It may help us all to recall that the need for reformation is not nearly so much the outward celebration of an annual event as it is the need to begin each day (with an inward reformation celebration).

The Reformation past was a vast movement involving whole nations over many years of history. The reformation present, on the other hand, is a personal and daily celebration. Each of us is to face each new day under the renewed grace of God alone. Forgiveness for the past has been earned by Christ on the cross, and the new man needs to come forth each day and take over against the sins of yesterday.

The person who depends on history and singing "A Mighty Fortress" once or twice does not know that real reformation is. And that also includes all in this fellowship who can take pride in our own confessional past but largely ignore the on-going nature of this festival.

A *Lutheran Spokesman* editorial out of the past regularly comes to memory, the gist of which is well worth repeating. Concerning a then four-year-old CLC, the lead article began: "We are not a strong church body. We are weak, and we are sick. We are an offshoot of the Synodical Conference, a dying church, a tree cut down under the judgment of God. We are not the cream, the saving of the best.

"We have been conditioned to think that if a church has the correct presentation of the doctrine that it must be a good church. But this is not so. We are judging by external appearance. What we see does not tell us how deep are the ulcers of the stomach, how far advanced the cancer in the lungs, how far developed the cirrhosis of the liver.

"The judgment of the Lord rests upon the churches of this land, and we are not exempt." Yes, the Lord has given us a blessing, a great one, and an undeserved one. He has also given us another opportunity, but we are in grave danger of throwing it away if we look to ourselves, if we think we have purified ourselves of all the weaknesses of the present age . . . It is always fatal to boast (as some did in John 8:33) 'we are Abraham's children'" (May, 1965, Vol. 7, #12).

Beginning With Me

But now let us resolve as we celebrate Reformation past also to encourage one another: "Lord, let the Reformation, glorious in history, begin anew in me each day"—and the blessings of God on our fellowship will continue.

Reformation is a present, on-going, daily battle with that unholy trinity of Satan, world, and self. We will feel a part of Martin Luther and the Reformation past never so much as when we, together with him, by Word and Sacrament, make it the rule that the new man daily comes forth and arises who shall live before God in righteousness and purity (His—and ours by faith alone!) forever.

Reformation past? Celebrate it with gusto. Reformation present? Begin it anew right now. -B. J. Naumann
