

Today's Scriptures

First Lesson – Zephaniah 3:14-17

14 Sing, O Daughter of Zion; shout aloud, O Israel! Be glad and rejoice with all your heart, O Daughter of Jerusalem! 15 The LORD has taken away your punishment, he has turned back your enemy. The LORD, the King of Israel, is with you; never again will you fear any harm. 16 On that day they will say to Jerusalem, "Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands hang limp. 17 The LORD your God is with you, he is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, he will quiet you with his love, he will rejoice over you with singing."

Psalm for the Day – From Psalm 66

- P Shout with joy to God, all the earth!:
- C Sing the glory of his name; make his praise glorious!
- P Praise our God, O peoples:
- C Let the sound of his praise be heard.
- P He has preserved our lives:

Second Lesson – Luke 3:7-18

7 John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? 8 Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. 9 The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire." 10 "What should we do then?" the crowd asked. 11 John answered, "The man with two tunics should share with him who has none, and the one who has food should do the same." 12 Tax collectors also came to be baptized. "Teacher," they asked, "what should we do?" 13 "Don't collect any more than you are required to," he told them. 14 Then some soldiers asked him, "And what should we do?" He replied, "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely—be content with your pay." 15 The people were waiting expectantly and were all wondering in their hearts if John might possibly be the Christ. 16 John answered them all, "I baptize you with water.

But one more powerful than I will come, the thongs of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire. 17 His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." 18 And with many other words John exhorted the people and preached the good news to them.

Sermon Text - Philippians 4:4-7

4 Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! 5 Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. 6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. 7 And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions December 13-18

Mon Zephaniah 3:14-20 Judah (the South) was sliding downhill morally, and that bothered God enough to engineer a novel way to rescue them. First, give them a good taste of His wrath—to humble them—and then display His generous kindness toward them (14-15), giving them reason to relax (16-17); **then** gather them home (18-20). History repeats itself because humans keep tussling with God for control of the steering wheel. Lord, have mercy!

Tues Luke 3:7-18 Baptizer John told people how God wanted them to behave (16). **If** their hearts were in it, they could be humanitarian (11), generous (12-13), and law-abiding (14). More importantly, **if** they took to heart John's message about Messiah, He would cleanse them (15-16) and bring them home at harvest time—the final Advent/Judgment Day (17).

Wed Philippians 4:4-7 We have good reason to *rejoice* all the time, for we are stocked with God's gracious gentleness (5), unfazed amid this world's craziness (6), and proactive in prayer (6). Bottom line: Since we are straight with God via Christ Jesus, we can face life with calmness and strength (7).

Thurs Zephaniah 3:8-13 is prelude to Monday's Bible selection, and lest we leave this Word of God in the dust of yesteryear—note that God has always had serious business with humanity (8). Serious because we always need spiritual revival (9) of heart and soul (10-12). How else could sinners—or a degenerate nation—be transformed to *speak no lies, no deceitful tongue be found in their mouth, and no one shall make them afraid* (13)? God grant it!

Fri Mark 6:14-29 The Herodian dynasty lasted for four generations, and this pervert had a split personality; he seemed open to both good and evil. We would like to ignore him, but God has a lesson embedded in the account: Evil people will murder God's messengers/missionaries prior to His Advent. Herod allowed lust and pride to overpower his weak conscience (20), and John became a martyr. This scenario is being replayed in our world today.

Sat Philippians 4:2-3 As we celebrate Jesus' first Advent, we are looking forward to His Advent return – and for good reason, of course. Perhaps one reason easily passed over is that in heaven we shall meet people we have never known on Earth. People like Euodia, Syntyche, Clement, and others whose names are written in the Book of Life. We know the names of a handful more—as recorded in the ledger of Romans 16:1-16, Colossians 4:7-17, 2 Timothy 4:19-21, Titus 3:12-13, etc, etc. Note: Apostle Paul listed these names very close to the black-list of those who hindered the Advent messengers and/or should be avoided because they do not serve the Lord Jesus Christ. Come quickly, Lord Jesus, lest we wither on the vine!
