

TODAY'S SCRIPTURES

First Lesson – Isaiah 55:1-5

1 "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. 2 Why spend money on what is not bread, and your labor on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and your soul will delight in the richest of fare. 3 Give ear and come to me; hear me, that your soul may live. I will make an everlasting covenant with you, my faithful love promised to David. 4 See, I have made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander of the peoples. 5 Surely you will summon nations you know not, and nations that do not know you will hasten to you, because of the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has endowed you with splendor."

Second Lesson – Romans 8:35-39

35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? 36 As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered." 37 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. 38 For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, 39 neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Sermon Text – Matthew 14:13-21

13 When Jesus heard what had happened, he withdrew by boat privately to a solitary place. Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns. 14 When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed their sick. 15

As evening approached, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a remote place, and it's already getting late. Send the crowds away, so they can go to the villages and buy themselves some food." 16 Jesus replied, "They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat." 17 "We have here only five loaves of bread and two fish," they answered. 18 "Bring them here to me," he said. 19 And he directed the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. 20 They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. 21 The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children.

DAILY BIBLE READINGS FOR HOME DEVOTIONS – AUGUST 10-15

Mon Isaiah 55:1-5 "Is anyone out there who is thirsty?" "Yes, I'm here, but what thirst do you mean?" "I mean thirst for God and the things of God." "OK, but what will it cost?" "Not one cent from you, for God gives His good things free of charge." What things?" "The mercies He gave David (3-4), assured by His self-sacrificing Son, Jesus, the wellspring of salvation for all."

Tues Matthew 14:13-21 Did those hungry people ask for a miracle? Probably not, and neither did the disciples—yet Jesus gave them more than they needed when He opened heaven's storehouse (19), and from His hands each portion sprouted more portions, over and over again. How else would those thousands of hungry people get fed, and have leftovers besides? God is good at doing miracles—but you already knew that.

Wed Romans 8:35-39 Without God's miracle-love in Jesus, how could we survive tribulations and stresses, let alone crop failure, poverty, rioting, or other threats (35)? Granted that Christians are targets (36), and despite the hostiles, God pulls us through because He loves us (37). There's nothing and nobody, neither now nor tomorrow, no matter how ugly our situation, that can wedge us apart from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Thurs Psalms 42 and 43 are twins in form (42:5 ditto 43:5) as well as in content. When someone thirsts for God, gets dry mouthed about it, and feels bereft without God, that reveals a crucial human need—for which God is ready and waiting to satisfy with His love. So let's soak up the water that flows from Him to us via His Word (43:3) and praise Him for the fountain.

Fri Mark 2:2-12 What faith did Jesus see (5)? Well, they were confident that Jesus was both willing and able to heal their friend's paralysis. Jesus gave more than they asked, for He turned His heart and hands to the more important issue of healing a soul from crippling sin. Of course, the visible miracle proved the validity of the invisible miracle (10). [It's Godly math.]

Sat Acts 15:22-41 The HCC (Holy Christian Church) convention adopted the Mission report, wrote up a Recommendation, and sent it by courier to the church in Antioch [See Attachment, 23-29]. When the Recommendation was delivered and read, it was accepted with thanks (30-31). Everyone breathed a sigh of relief, and Bible teaching/ preaching/instructing prevailed (35). It seemed a good idea to re-visit out-lying congregations, too, so while Mark and Barnabas sailed for Cyprus, Paul and Silas trekked overland into Asia Minor. Note: splitting up into two groups was good logistics, for that way no congregation would be by-passed or neglected. Praise the Lord!
