

First Lesson – Job 7:1-7

Job's Lament: My Life Has No Hope

1 "Has not man a hard service on earth, and are not his days like the days of a hired hand? 2 Like a slave who longs for the shadow, and like a hired hand who looks for his wages, 3 so I am allotted months of emptiness, and nights of misery are apportioned to me. 4 When I lie down I say, 'When shall I arise?' But the night is long, and I am full of tossing till the dawn. 5 My flesh is clothed with worms and dirt; my skin hardens, then breaks out afresh. 6 My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle and come to their end without hope. 7 "Remember that my life is a breath; my eye will never again see good.

Second Lesson – 1 Corinthians 9:19-27

Serving Others for Christ's Sake While Striving to Obtain the Prize

19 For though I am free from all, I have made myself a servant to all, that I might win more of them. 20 To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win

Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though not being myself under the law) that I might win those under the law. 21 To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law. 22 To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. 23 I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings. 24 Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one receives the prize? So run that you may obtain it. 25 Every athlete exercises self-control in all things. They do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. 26 So I do not run aimlessly; I do not box as one beating the air. 27 But I discipline my body and keep it under control, lest after preaching to others I myself should be disqualified.

Sermon Text – Mark 1:29-39 *Jesus Heals Many While Preaching in Galilee*

29 And immediately he left the synagogue and entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. 30 Now Simon's mother-in-law lay ill with a fever, and immediately they told him about her. 31 And he came and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and the fever left her, and she began to serve them. 32 That evening at sundown they brought to him all who were sick or oppressed by demons. 33 And the whole city was gathered together at the door. 34 And he healed many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons. And he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him. 35 And rising very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he departed and went out to a desolate place, and there he prayed. 36 And Simon and those who were with him searched for him, 37 and they found him and said to him, "Everyone is looking for you." 38 And he said to them, "Let us go on to the next towns, that I may preach there also, for that is why I came out." 39 And he went throughout all Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Last Sunday the St. Paul Voters resolved to set our Cooperative Budget Plan (CBP) Estimate for 2024 at \$11,500. To meet our goal CBP offerings of \$221 will be needed each week during 2024. To give an offering for this purpose write the amount of your gift in the "CBP" blank on your envelope. St. Paul parishioners who prefer to give offerings for God's kingdom work without using an envelope are welcome to do so. Last year, under God's blessing, we exceeded our CBP estimate. We thank Him for helping us do this and for His goodness in helping us meet our local budgetary needs at St. Paul as well.

Summary of how your 2024 CBP offerings will be used::

- Subsidy to Immanuel Lutheran High School, College, and Seminary in Eau Claire WI 58¢ out of every dollar
- CLC missions subsidy (domestic missions & overseas) 36ϕ
- CLC administration costs − 5¢
- Costs related to "education" & synod publications − 1¢

Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions February 5-10, '24

Mon John 6:26-35 Jesus is the Bread of Life, and His miraculous feeding of the thousands in the wilderness was a sign of the greater feeding that He does by His forgiving word. That feeding brings life eternal!

Tues 1 John 4:7-17 God is love. He showed that love by sending His own Son (the Son of God) into the world that we may live through Him. We reflect His love by loving one another and confessing that Jesus is the Son of God, thus sharing the Bread of Life.

Wed Jeremiah 18:1-10 The Lord of the nations has the right to deal with the nations as a potter would deal with the clay in his hands, and He has the mercy to forgive those who repent and relent from sending the promised disaster.

Thurs Matthew 17:1-9 Jesus is facing suffering and death to bring us life (16:21) and receives the support of Old Testament believers Moses and Elijah (v3). The voice of the Father declares Him to be the beloved Son, to be revealed when and how He wishes (v9).

Fri 2 Peter 1:16-21 After the resurrection, Peter remembers how Jesus received honor and glory from God the Father on the mountain of Transfiguration. This glory is also given to Jesus in the Scriptures, like a lamp shining in a dark place.

Sat Isaiah 25:1-9 The Lord's name is to be praised! His might is greater than the fortified city of His enemies (v1-5), and His mercy provides a banquet for the poorest of His own people (v6-9). "Let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation!" (v9)
